Welcome

1 Claire Taylor opened the meeting, welcoming everyone and thanked Microsoft for a wonderful evening last night.

Microsoft – AI & Copilot - A realistic approach for the end users and how we meet their needs.

Alan Crawford, Education Modern Workplace Specialist at Microsoft provided an overview of the many flavours of Copilot and provide plenty food for thought with regards to the types of AI we might wish to use going forwards.

Alan spoke to the key considerations for AI transformations, what are your goals and how can AI help achieve them.

He highlighted the self assessment tool to allow us to establish if we AI-ready and also mentioned Microsoft Fast Track which can do an assessment for us.

There was a discussion regarding the age groups that could use Co-Pilot and noted that there seem to be some inconsistency with the online documentation **ACTION:** Alan to share details after the meeting.

It was noted that there is a new attribute in Entra to make sure we provision accounts correctly **ACTION: Alan to** circulate documentation to help ensure we are provisioning account correctly in Entra.

It was suggested that if you can save 11 minutes a day over 11 weeks of use, you would offset the cost of Copilot. Results from an Early Access Program survey reported that when questioned, 77% of respondents would choose access to Copilot over free lunch!

When looking at the possible concerns of Copilot, it was highlighted that sustainability not on the list **ACTION:**Alan agreed to check on the impact of Scope 2 emissions and report back

It was questioned if we could receive reports on the usage of Copilot for which Alan highlighted the Viva suite of tools that are being expanded and it was noted that the licensing of Copilot was unclear. **ACTION: Grid of licenses and what comes with which license to be generated and circulated.**

Alan closed his presentation highlighting the art prompting and the ingredients of a good prompt, touched on Copilot Studio and reminded us that we could sign into the free version of Copilot for M365 using our tenancy credentials and noted the resources available at adoption.micorosoft.com

Annual General Meeting

USECEC Workshop strategic prioritises

6 Victoria Dishon

Scope of group: Focus on efficiencies and effectiveness of working together across the sector, with actions which often or specifically are targeted to have a positive impact with regards to addressing the climate change emergency.

Focus: USECEC will act to identify the key strategic and operational priorities within member institutions with the aim to develop an action plan to deliver meaningful and measurable progress in these key areas. The annual planning forum workshop is scheduled for late June to facilitate the discovery phase and to draft an initial action plan for consideration.

Annual planning forum – HEIDS membership assistance in identifying areas of strategic and operational priority. VD issued a survey form to gather strategic and operational priorities from HEIDS members, with the following areas identified and discussed:

- Financial sustainability Doing more with less/being more efficient with what we have, what place does AI have to enable and access efficiency and at what cost?
- Digital transformation not a net zero cost, how to leverage our collective and individual institutional data to make better informed choices which empower institutions to consider changes to processes, people, and estates in a shared way.
- IT as an enabler, working in partnership with the other professional service groups to support change programmes.
